Doppelganger: Media clones serving Russian propaganda – This report exposed a Russia-based influence operation network and describes the way the operation used 'clones' of authentic media sites to target users with disinformation. The operation is

described as a cross-platform campaign used to promulgate Russian government narratives about Ukraine. This coordinated operation involved cloning the appearance and credit of authentic journalistic content to disseminate blatant disinformation, *EU DisinfoLab*. Read here.



The resulting report outlines the threats that language models pose to the information environment if used to augment disinformation campaigns and introduces a framework for analyzing potential mitigations, Computers and Society. The authors suggest this use is an example of CCP willingness to experiment and innovate in shaping online political discourse, particularly on those topics that have the potential to disrupt its strategic objectives, Australian Strategic Policy Institute.
