UCalgary evaluates Indigenous research using the TCPS 2 Ch. 9 Research Involving the First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Peoples of Canada definition. This definition, provided below, represents the minimum bar for Indigenous research, not the maximum.

Criteria TCPS 2 Chapter 9		
"Where the research is likely to affect the welfare of an Indigenous community, or communities, to which prospective participants belong, researchers shall seek engagement with the relevant community."		
a. Is this research pursued on First Nations, Inuit, and Métis lands , which include reserves, Métis settlements, and lands governed under a self-government agreement or an Inuit or First Nations land claim agreement?		
b. Research that seeks input from participants regarding a community's cultural heritage, artifacts, traditional knowledge or unique characteristics ;		
c. Research in which Indigenous identity or membership in an Indigenous community is used as a variable for the purpose of analysis of the research data;		
d. Interpretation of research results that will refer to Indigenous communities, peoples, language, history, or culture.		
e. recruitment criteria that include Indigenous identity as a factor for the entire study or for a subgroup in the study;		
Does the research project impact Indigenous Peoples and/or Communities at an overrepresented level? *For example, Indigenous youth make up 74% of youth in foster care in Alberta, while only 7.7% of the youth population.		
Is the research project an Indigenous research project? If the answer is yes to any of the criteria, the project is considered Indigenous research. For further clarification, please contact IRST at irst@ucalgary.ca .
